
A new program called Sporting Schools will take its place some time during 2015 but as yet we do not know what form this will take.

Stage 3 students have recently concluded their study of Michael Morpurgo's text "War Horse", a novel set during World War 1, told from a horse's perspective. After reading the text, the students thoroughly enjoyed the movie and were able to identify different strategies used to influence the reader/viewer. Some thoughts on the book:

Rhees: I think the author Michael Morpurgo wanted people to know about the horrors of war and to also get us to think about how many horses died and how badly they were treated. This book made me reflect back and think about that. I think it's important to say that this book is sad and intense. I would recommend this book for an older and more mature audience.

B T: The story is written in first person. through the eyes of a horse named Joey. This is important to this story because it makes it a lot more dramatic. The setting is described in great detail and the characters' behaviour was described in great depth. It is a good story because it is dramatic, sad, exciting and uplifting.
